

FOOD FOR THOUGHT



My name is Rob Stevens and I am the Executive Chef of the **Primary Academies Trust**.

I am really excited to have taken this new role. I am initially going to focus on building a model kitchen operation at Sidbury C of E Primary School. As time progresses I will turn my attention to developing a Trust wide approach to healthy nutritional balanced school food catering and children's interaction and understanding of the importance of food.

The Trust has a vision for catering which will improve the quality of children's food, their dining experience and in the future generate income to go back into the classroom to support children's learning. The Primary Academies Trust will also focus within that vision on enhancing the community aspect of food across the Trust schools with approaches such as themed nights and family events.

DISH OF THE DAY

Really Heathy Pasta

1 tsp olive oil

1 large onion, chopped

1 carrot, peeled and chopped

2 celery sticks chopped

1 leek chopped

1 small aubergine, chopped

1 small courgette, chopped

2 peppers, deseeded and chopped

800g chopped tomatoes

2 cloves of garlic 300g dried pasta 1tsp balsamic vinegar and pinch of sugar Parmesan shavings or grated to taste.



Method

- 1. Heat the oil in a large non-stick saucepan and gently fry the garlic and onions. Next add the celery, carrot, courgette, aubergine and leek until soft, about 20 minutes. Add the peppers and cook for 10 minutes more, then tip in the tomatoes, sugar and vinegar. Simmer for at least 20 minutes - the longer the better.
- 2. Cook the pasta following pack instructions. Meanwhile, blend the sauce with a hand blender until smooth, season and return to the heat to keep warm while the pasta cooks. Drain the pasta and toss through the sauce. Serve in bowls topped with shaved Parmesan if you like.
- 3. If you want to turn this into an exciting bolognaise sauce, then fry 500g of mince or soya mince in olive oil and add to the sauce when it has been blended.
